

Medical Preparedness and Response to Bombing Incidents

Course Scheduling:

Prior to placing your class on the schedule, you will need to obtain final approval from your state SAA office. I will be happy to answer any additional questions you might have and will coordinate with you as we move forward with your request.

Course Fees:

As with other NDPC courses, **this course is delivered free of charge**. Our grant with DHS subsidizes all instructional and staff fees related to delivery. It does not cover staff salaries or travel expenses incurred by students attending the course. As a host entity you are not allowed to charge students to attend the class unless you are recovering expenses for any break items, coffee, sodas, etc. or have expenses to rent a site. You are not allowed to charge a fee in order to generate profit or cover overhead expenses. If you have additional questions regarding this please visit with our staff when they call to confirm your dates.

Course Logistics:

In order to host the program we will need the following:

- * a **minimum of 26** students, we will ask for a pre-course roster 2 weeks from the start of the class which only needs to show registered student names. That may be faxed or e-mailed to me.
- * we can handle a **maximum of 50** students per class, if you have more than that please advise and we will consider options such as scheduling a second class or sending additional instructors
- * you need to supply two (2) instructional rooms, one large enough to hold the maximum students you anticipate and the second capable of supporting at least 1/2 of the total students. All rooms should have writing surfaces and chairs. Projection device is preferred but not required for each room
- * this is a 16 hour class, normal class times are 8-5, unless otherwise requested. Normal class days are Tues/Wed, unless otherwise requested. We also have ability to deliver back to back or alternative schedule programs upon request
- * the class is conducted entirely indoors and includes traditional classroom style instruction, facilitated instruction, small group and a table top exercise at completion of the program

Target Audience:

- * the primary audience for this course as first receivers and first responders. This group consists of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel and first receiver staff such as nurses and physicians (particularly those who staff emergency rooms) and emergency managers. The secondary audience includes all other disciplines that may be involved in the medical response to an explosive incident, such as fire service, law enforcement, and public health personnel.
- * students are eligible for CE through CECBEMS, ENA and American Academy of Family Practitioners
- * students will declare their track, operational or command. This will determine breakout tracks they attend, as well as content for pre and post course assessments.

Course Content:

Content delivered will include modules which discuss: London Bombing Case Study, Identification of Potential Terrorist Threats and Targets, Explosives and Characteristics, Pre-Attack Indicators of a Bombing Incident, Bombing Incident Injury Patterns and Treatment, Triage, General Pre and Post-Detonation Response Considerations, Strategic and Command Considerations, Tactical and Operational Considerations, Resource Management, Exercise

Pre-Requisites:

- * there are no pre-requisites for this class. Recommended background includes familiarity with the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS) via completion of FEMA independent study courses IS-100, IS-200, and IS-700 (or their equivalents)
